




A Brief History of the Hunter Baillie Memorial Presbyterian Church

Erected between 1886 and 1889 by Mrs Helen Mackie Baillie as a memorial to her late husband, John Hunter Baillie (1818 - 1854), the church is Sydney's finest example of pure Gothic revival architecture. Its spire reaches a dramatic height of 56m (182 ft).

The interior is finely proportioned, having massive pillars of Aberdeen granite with Melbourne bluestone bases and capitals. The superbly carved baptismal font and pulpit are of New Zealand Oamaru stone and green marble.

Also within the church is the great organ by William Hill & Son of London. With its iconic casework it represents a grand example of English 19th century organ building that has survived without compromise or modernisation.

WHAT NEEDS TO HAPPEN?

The work required is extensive - many stones need to be completely replaced. Our conservation plan includes:

- an immediate make-safe, especially of pinnacles, flying buttresses, spire and parapet stones;
- lower sandstone work, especially on parapets, plinths and projecting stone;
- repair of the wrought iron and sandstone fence;
- restoration of stained glass windows;
- conservation of tessellated floor tiles;
- interior painting of the Hall;
- restoration of the Hill & Son organ.

WHO WILL FUND THE REPAIRS?

Apart from supporting the ministry, the church's regular income just stretches to essential building maintenance and day to day running costs. The total amount required is \$4.5 million, so much money needs to be raised. The funds will be managed by a committee appointed by both the Church and the National Trust (NSW) and all work will be overseen by the Heritage Architect.
